Resource Management

Forest Practice Program

Plan Submissions (through 05/31/2019)

- **THP Submissions**: The number of THP submissions through May was approximately 9% lower than the number of submissions through May of last year (86 compared to 95 in 2018).
- NTMP/WFMP Submissions: The total number of NTMP submissions so far this year
 was approximately 33% lower than the number of submissions through May of 2018 (6
 compared to 9 in 2018). About 21 NTOs have been submitted this year; approximately
 61% less than the 54 NTOs submitted through May 2018. The first WFMP has been
 received for a project area in the Cascade Region.
- Exemption Notice Submissions: Exemption submissions were approximately 5% lower through May compared to the same period last year (801 compared to 841 in 2018). Nearly 204 Butte Post-Fire Recovery Exemptions have been accepted to date, covering an area of approximately 600 acres. About 10 Forest Fire Prevention Exemptions have been accepted to date, encompassing approximately 1,441 acres.
- Emergency Notice Submissions: Emergency Notice submissions were approximately 8% higher through May of 2019 than submissions over the same period last year (118 compared to 109 in 2018). Approximate acreage in Emergencies this year has increased by approximately 134% (18,253 acres acers compared to 7,806 in 2018).
- Plan Approval: The number of THPs approved through May is approximately 18% lower than the number approved for the same period of 2018 (92 compared to 112). The 6 NTMPs approved as of May 2019 is the same as the number approved during the same period of 2018.

Watershed Protection Program Update

- The 2019 Caspar Creek Experimental Watershed annual meeting was held in Fort Bragg from May 8-9, with research updates from the various Third Experiment studies, and a field tour of recent timber harvesting in the South Fork. The CAL FIRE Business Services Office is working toward having the new five-year contract between CAL FIRE and the USFS Pacific Southwest Research Station in place by June 30th.
- Post-fire research is ongoing at Boggs Mountain Demonstration State Forest, which burned in the 2015 Valley Fire. Staff are working with Dr. Joe Wagenbrenner, USFS PSW, to complete the BMP evaluation component of the project. A demonstration site has been selected to test alternative salvage logging BMPs and monitor their effectiveness. Automated bird recorders were deployed on BMDSF on May 23rd for the third year of the study to determine differences in bird occupancy of four silviculture treatments in a post-fire setting (burned and unsalvaged; burned and salvage logged; burned, salvage logged, planted and sprayed; and control).

Timber Regulation and Forest Restoration Fund (TRFRF) Activities [Updated from the TRFRF Database (01/01/2019 through 4/30/2019)]

 Since January 1, 2019, the Department has expended 46,560 hours in conducting Forest Practice Program activities funded by TRFRF. An additional 2,890 hours of Forest Practice Program activities not funded by TRFRF has also been completed. Combined, Department staff has recorded 49,450 hours of Forest Practice related activities thus far in the new year.

Timber Operators Licensing (LTO) and Forest Practice Enforcement Updates

 The Forest Practice Enforcement Program has received one case report in the last month. Five cases have been received thus far in 2019. Currently there are 77 active cases. The Timber Operator licensing program continues to process license applications and insurance certificates. A timber operator licensing class was recently added and will be held June 26-27 in Roseville.

Resource Protection and Improvement Program

Urban and Community Forestry (UCF)

- The program awarded 25 grant projects totaling nearly \$17 million dollars in May.
 Funding is from California Climate Investments and Proposition 68. Further details about the awarded projects can be found at:

- The California Urban Forestry Advisory Committee (CUFAC) met May 8-9 at the LA Moran Nursery in Davis and completed an outline of an updated strategic plan for the program. A completed version of the new strategic plan is expected to be ready for review by the Director in July 2019, and will be released once approved.

Demonstration State Forests

Boggs Mountain

An emergency evacuation route has been established through the Las Posadas
 Experimental Forest for the community of Angwin. Signage has been installed and
 spot rocking and grading of the road is complete with plans of showcasing the route to
 the public sometime in mid-June.

Jackson

 The spring Jackson Advisory Group (JAG) meeting was held on May 7th. The group heard program updates from staff, reviewed the proposed Road 540/pygmy restoration project and reviewed two proposed THPs (Soda Gulch and Boundary Creek). The recent rains, totaling over seven inches, have triggered storm event sampling in the Caspar Watershed and set back sampling plans for the SWAMP protocol in the South Fork Caspar. The amphibian study had to suspend work and the installation of stream temperature monitoring equipment was also delayed because of high flows.

LaTour

 Forest Manager, Jason Poburko is continuing to work with CALFIRE Technical Services to obtain both short term right-of-way agreements, and permeant easements to produce full legal access to the northern parcels at LaTour and to Ellen Picket.

Mountain Home

Forest Manager, Jim Kral led a tour of 20 Spanish forestry students from I.E.S.
Hozgarganta, a 2-year technical forestry program. This proved to be a successful
recruiting strategy as all students want to return and work for Jim on the forest upon
graduation.

Lewis A. Moran Reforestation Center (LAMRC)

- The annual cone survey materials are being finalized and will be sent out to our Unit forestry staff as well as many interested groups and individuals. We have made a concerted effort this year to raise awareness about our need to expand our cone survey effort.
- LAMRC continues to work with Technical Services on contracts for the restoration of the two existing greenhouses and construction of the new greenhouse/shadehouse.
 We expect to have restored and functional greenhouses by the end of the summer.

California Forest Improvement Program (CFIP)

 CFIP program is working on preparing informational materials, website and the User's Guide for the new fiscal year and potential new funding sources for the program.

Forest Legacy Program

CAL FIRE has submitted 3 projects for federal 2020 FY Forest Legacy consideration
with the scoring and review at the national level having occurred in January 2019.
Results have yet to be released, but the hope is this will occur in late spring or early
summer of 2019.

Forest Pest Management

 Staff will be training new foresters in forest insect and disease recognition and management in Redding, June 4-6. This is a joint training with the USFS held annually. To date, trainings have also been held in southern California for the new gold spotted oak borer infestation areas in San Bernardino and Orange Counties.

- The 7th Sudden Oak Death Science Symposium will be held in San Francisco on June 25–27.
- The summer field tour for the California Forest Pest Council will be held July 16-18 in the Fort Bragg area. This will be a joint meeting of the insect, disease, animal damage and weed committees of the Pest Council.
- Staff and many other interested folks have been working with CDFA on developing the Invasive Shot Hole Borer Action Plan. The plan will guide the dispersal of 5 million dollars in state funds to help control and mitigate the pest complexes.
- There has been an increase in Ips Engraver beetle activity noted along the coastal areas of northern California.

Climate and Energy

Forest Health Grant Program

 The CAL FIRE Forest Health Grant Program awarded \$63.4 million of California Climate Investment funds. There were 16 projects that were selected to receive grant funds. Of those 16, 3 were Forest Legacy Projects. Fire Protection

Fire Protection Program

Law Enforcement/Civil Cost Recovery

- Last month, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement made 7 arrests and issued 22 citations (excluding PRC 4291).
- Last month, CAL FIRE received no reimbursements resulting from Civil Cost Recovery actions.
- After a thorough investigation, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement Officers have determined that the 2018 Pawnee Fire that burned 15,185 acres in Lake County, CA was sparked by target shooting. Investigators were dispatched as part of the initial response to the Pawnee Fire and immediately began working to determine the origin and cause of the fire. The ensuing investigation uncovered evidence that target shooting sparked the fire on June 23, 2018. CAL FIRE was assisted during the course of the investigation by the Lake County Sheriff's Department, Lake County District Attorney's Office, Sonoma County Sheriff's Department and Rohnert Park Department of Public Safety.

- On May 20th, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement Officers in Tehama Glenn Unit responded to a fire near Henleyville. The officer contacted an adult male who stated he started three fires. The officer arrested the suspect for three counts of PC 452, recklessly causing a fire and was transported and booked into Tehama County jail without further incident.
- On May 21st, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement Officers in Siskiyou Unit arrested an adult male for arson to property and vegetation. The arrest was the result a of two-week investigation in which an arrest warrant was issued and safely executed. The suspect was arrested, transported and booked in the Siskiyou County jail without further incident.
- On May 21st, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement Officers working in Shasta County arrested a juvenile for five counts of arson to the vegetation. The juvenile was booked into the Shasta County Juvenile Hall without further incident.

Fire Protection Operations

- Command & Control is Actively engaged in coordination with CalOES State Warning Center and State Operations Center regarding CAL FIRE's role at the command center level for disseminating potential and imminent Public Safety Power Shut Off (PSPS) information.
- We have completed 1003 AVL/MDT installations, total remaining is 174 (MVU and RRU). Due to lack of payment, the AVL vendor (Radio Mobile) has suspended installations of new hardware until accounts are paid. We are delayed at least one week, and if further delays occur, this will push back the entire calendar for remaining installations. All requested FCC Licenses have been granted. VHF component now has 30 approved frequencies with 31 tower sites which will provide additional coverage in areas with marginal or no cellular coverage.
- The Fire Protection Operations Staff Chief presented concerns regarding telecommunications site hardening and resiliency at the CA Public Utilities Commission "En Banc" meeting on May 20th. CAL FIRE may be approached at a later date to participate in a working group to provide recommendations.

Aviation Management Unit/Tactical Air Operations

- S-70i Blackhawk Helicopter Implementation Group continues planning and preparation for delivery of new helicopters. The delivery of the first helicopter is now estimated for the end of July. The second Blackhawk is currently in the paint shop in Texas.
- The CAL FIRE/CHP Aviation Integration Training is in progress and is currently 50% complete. Training is expected to be complete by the middle of June.
- The annual training for all the California National Guard (CNG) Aviation assets has been completed with the exception of Channel Islands. They are currently deployed overseas and will be available for their training in August when they return.

- All Southern Air Attack bases have been staffed since May 15th; all Northern Air Attack bases will be staffed by June 1st.
- The first C-130 is slated to come to CAL FIRE in 2021. It went to New Mexico to strip and paint in CAL FIRE paint scheme last week.
- Hail damage to one OV-10 and one DynCorp Cessna 172 occurred in Redding over the Memorial Day Weekend caused by a late-season storm that dropped golf ball sized hail across the area.
- All annual pilot training has been completed for this year.

Mobile Equipment Management

- Mobile Equipment received the first of three Mobile Command Centers on April 26, 2019, to replace our aging fleet.
- New fire engines from Boise Mobile Equipment continue to arrive, get processed, and sent to the field in preparation of the 2019 fire season.
- Approximately 60 light duty vehicles have been processed through DGS to be surveyed and off the CAL FIRE inventory. These surveyed vehicles were replaced by new light duty vehicles.
- The first of two Fixed Price auctions for fire engines has closed and awaiting mail in bids to be received.

Cooperative Fire Program

Conservation Camp Program

- The 2019 Spring Fire Crew Preparedness Exercises are almost complete, with only one weather delay and crew re-testing scheduled.
- The Ventura Training Center (VTC) Fire Crew 1 successfully completed their first Crew Preparedness Exercise and are now VTC's first Type I hand crew.
- The current statewide shortage of fire crew members assigned to fire crews is 1056 (a shortage increase of 103 from 953 on April 24, 2019). The inmate population stands at 79% of capacity (-6%), while crew capacity stands at 68% (-3%).

Local Government Program

 The Local Government Program is continuing to review and process Local Government agreement renewals for FY 2019/2020. Work also continues with the Units and Budget Office on Schedule A budget loads for FY 2019/2020.

State-Federal Program

 Staff attended the California Fire Assistance Agreement (CFAA) committee meeting to work on the rewrite of the agreement which expires in December 2019. Progress on the rewrite continues slowly following a USFS internal audit finding the CFAA was not properly aligned with federal law. CAL FIRE supports the policy of the master mutual aid in California and is working with all signatory agencies to resolve the differences quickly ahead of peak fire activity this summer and fall. CAL FIRE remains committed to renewing the CFAA prior to its expiration. The next CFAA Committee meeting is scheduled for June 12, 2019.

Safety/EMS Program

- On May 8, 2019, at approximately 1:30 PM, a CAL FIRE Hand Crew inmate firefighter
 was participating in a hand line construction performance exam at the Ishi Fire Crew
 Preparedness Exercise. During the performance exam, a chainsaw strike occurred to
 a second inmate's left arm. The inmate firefighter was treated at the scene and
 transported to the hospital by air ambulance for further evaluation. An informational
 summary report regarding this injury was distributed statewide to remind employees of
 the 5 feet exclusion zone from chainsaws.
- The CAL FIRE EMS Program processed 58 EMT Certification/Recertification applications that were received in April 2019.
- CAL FIRE's Research and Development Program continues to process research
 proposals and is actively involved in partnership with the Department of General
 Services (DGS) and the California Department of Technology (CDT), Request for
 Innovative Ideas (RFI2) solicitation for Wildfire Management relating to wildfire
 detection and prediction.

Training Program

- The Regular Basic Cadet (RBC) peace officer graduation is set for June 7, 2019, beginning at 10:00 AM at the CAL FIRE Training Center in Ione, CA.
- The Department leadership curriculum continues to be developed, Leadership Level 1 and Leadership Level 2. The working group is currently working with the Blanchard Group to provide "real world" leadership content.
- During the week of May 13th, CAL FIRE had ten employees successfully pass a multiagency Area Command class (S-620) hosted by the US Forest Service and CAL FIRE.
- The Prescribed Fire Curriculum Working Group is in the process of developing a Burn Boss type class that is agency specific. This group has representation from the Prescribed Fire Working Group, Region and Unit level leaders.

- The Statewide Training Committee approved the re-write for the Department's chainsaw program. It will now start the Department process for approval.
- The Department Serious Accident Review Team class starts the week of June 3rd. This is the first time the class will be taught as class and not a workshop.

Office of the State Fire Marshal

Wildland Fire Prevention Engineering

Wildland Fire Prevention Engineering

- Defensible Space inspections are being ramped up throughout the state.
- Continue to analyze multiple proposed legislation on potential impact to Department and Program.
- Staff continue working with the CAL FIRE-Office of the State Fire Marshal Wildland Urban Interface Building Code Committee in developing a list of low cost home retrofits per AB-2911 (2018).
- The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) approved the 8 Utility Wildfire Mitigation Plans.

Fire Plan

- Unit Fire Plans are being submitted for Region review.
- Staff are working with the Fire Resource and Assessment Program (FRAP) and the Board to begin the SRA (State Responsibility Area) Review. Following this review, a remapping effort of the Fire Hazard Severity Zones will begin.

California Incident Data & Statistics Program

- Completing final data transfer of fire investigation documents from the old incident management system (CAIRS) to new program (CaIFIRS). CAIRS program will be completely offline this August.
- Staff is conducting field training with CAL FIRE Units and local fire department agencies.

Land Use Planning

- Revising Program staff guidelines utilized while conducting meetings with local agency officials to incorporate newly enacted Government Code Requirements.
- Developing framework and job descriptions for new staff associated with SB 2911 as it relates to subdivision analysis.
- Firewise USA program has great interest statewide. Program staff is working with local onboarding of many communities. California leads the nation with the most active communities totaling 206, followed by Colorado at 179 and in third place Oregon with 152.

Fire Prevention Grants

- Staff closed out all former State Responsibility Area Fire Prevention Grants.
- The 18/19 Fire Prevention Grant agreements are in the process of being signed and approved.
